From Executive Director, Kate Hoepke:

Dear Members and Friends:

The pace of social unrest right now is dizzying. Mid-term primaries coinciding with televised hearings of the January 6th investigation. The leaked opinion from the Supreme Court threatening to overturn Roe v. Wade. Another shooting in the name of a racist conspiracy theory. The assault on Ukraine. All of this after two years of forced separation from friends and family. My heart hurts. My nervous system feels under attack. What are we to do?



As an organization centered on human

dignity, it makes sense to use our platform to educate ourselves and respond. Many of you have asked how SFV can act as a catalyst to organize for action. The staff and I are all in! We can research local efforts like the March for Reproductive Rights and notify members how

to participate. We can reach out to trusted allies like Liv Schaffer at USF to facilitate an intergenerational storytelling meet-up focused on life before and after Roe. We can sponsor a conversation with LGBTQ activists to gain a deeper understanding of the *Stonewall Generation*. All happening this month!

Staff members build the structure for these kinds of meaningful interactions, but it's up to each of you to bring them alive with your curiosity, participation, and leadership. For example, several months ago a small group of members organized a climate action group, aligned with Third Act, which is now expanding its purpose to include actions that Defend Democracy. Members are considering ways to mobilize voter turnout, fight voter suppression and support state legislation like the Fossil Fuel Divestment Act. I congratulate these members for their vision and chutzpah to act on it!

The Village model is predicated on member leadership, which takes many forms. Quick Guide to the June 7, 2022 Election

Ballots will be mailed to all registered voters. This means any voter may vote by mail instead of going to the polls on Election Day. Any registered voter may access their ballot using the

Accessible Vote-by-Mail system at *sfelections.org/access*. In-person voting opportunities are available at the City Hall Voting Center and over 588 polling places. City Hall Voting Center will be open the two weekends (May 28-29 and June 4-5) before Election Day. Weekend hours are from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Alice Neel was, in her own words, a "collector of souls". Working in relative obscurity for most of her bohemian life, Neel painted people ---- her neighbors, her children, friends, and random acquaintances. (The FBI agents who visited her while investigating her communist beliefs refused to pose, despite her request.) When she died at 84 in 1984, her apartment on the Upper West Side of New York, which also functioned as her studio, had over 300



canvases depicting people, most of which had never been shown in a gallery, let alone a museum. Neel hated the term "portrait", but as we look at her work we see the depictions of both the subject and the artist. And the depiction of a century.

Today, the right to vote is being eroded in many states across the U.S. Amidst a cloud of hateful bigotry and lies about stolen elections, citizens are being led to the edge of rebellion against democracy itself. To help Defend Our Democracy, we are forming the SFV Political Action Group. This group will continue to explore working with Third Act (a national network of elders supporting younger activists engaged in climate action & defending our democracy) and its new partner, Activate America, which is organizing a national effort to write postcards to voters in key swing states, educate voters, and mobilize voter turnout.

At this session, we will hear from an Activate America speaker who will share different ways that we can get involved in increasing civic engagement and fighting voter suppression, like working the polls and mobilizing voter turnout. We'll also learn about Senior to Senior, a young voter registration effort. We hope to identify a group member to act as a liaison between our group and Activate America's A-Team. This liaison will attend its meetings, report back, and help organize political actions.


Asian Art Museum Virtual Tour: Expressions of Gender


An ancient, Native, matriarchal society has been upended by centuries of genocide and colonialism. This has resulted in culturally sabotaged and isolated communities that are in a constant struggle to save what remains of their sacred identity. The Lakota women living on the Pine Ridge and Rosebud Indian Reservations in South Dakota are rising up against the forces that continue to suppress them. By preserving and protecting their ancestral values and wisdom, they provide a source of hope to their people. With exclusive access to the lives of 9 women, ranging in age from 10 to 98, we explore powerful testimonials of loss and survival as we gain insight into the experience of a modern day Indigenous American living on an Indian Reservation. Gripping historical accounts and startling timely statistics guide viewers down the path that has led to these present day conditions.

The indelible voices of these determined women inspire us with their strength, gifting us with ancient insights that speak to our current global, environmental and cultural crises. These are the powerfully rich stories of the brave women and children living in the poorest county in the United States.

While the facts of the climate crisis are increasingly evident, many individuals, corporations, and governments have not listened or taken action. As a result, concerned citizens have been losing the battle to save our climate. To help to save our climate, we are forming the SFV Climate Action Group. This group will continue working with Third Act, a national network of elders supporting younger activists engaged in climate action & defending our



democracy. We will participate in a national divestment strategy to end financial support from major US banks for fossil fuel companies. We will discuss plans to protect our climate by supporting SB 1173, the CA Fossil Fuel Divestment Act.

In addition, we will work with Elders Climate Action to track/support climate action legislation, and engage in the Environmental Voters Project to encourage environmental activists to become consistent voters in every election. We will also work to end the crisis in plastic pollution and track/support plastic pollution legislation. Finally, we will work to promote climate education for CA students. We will identify a group member to be the Climate Action liaison to Third Act's Bay Area Working Group. This liaison will attend its meetings, report back, and help organize climate actions.
