What all these groups have in common is that they're led by members, whose contribution of time and talent is invaluable.



In fact, SFV wouldn't be what it is today without member leadership. I'm deeply grateful to all members, past and present, who have shared a vision for caring community and taken action to make that vision come to life. Some are good planners and organizers who know their way around a spreadsheet, while others have skills for active listening and group facilitation. What they all share is a desire for community, a spirit of experimentation and the heart to forge new relationships at this time in their lives.

I'm most appreciative to Roberta Rothman and Ellen Sandler, two bighearted women who help manage the Circle leaders and host a quarterly luncheon where people share their joys and challenges of leadership. Bobbie and Ellen, thank you for your wisdom, humor, flexibility and commitment over these many years. You've helped SFV grow from a sapling into a Mother Tree.

Last month we added another layer of support with Leadership Plus, a bi-monthly group to energize and encourage leaders with training, problem solving and role playing. This summer, we're drafting a Member Leadership Toolkit to help groups with things like establishing ground rules, active listening guidelines, meeting structure and passing the torch. The Beginning of the End of Plastics: The Plastics Labeling Project

The success of recycling plastics is the big lie. More than 90% of all plastic products wind up in landfills or shipped off to vulnerable countries. Join us to learn about the Plastics Labeling Project (PLP), which started in the SFV Climate Action Group. The initial goal of the PLP is to get warning labels on all plastic products made from petro-chemicals, informing consumers about how long these products will remain in the environment and their negative impact on all forms of life. Our hope is that more accurate labels on all plastic products will have a similar impact as those on cigarette packages, which helped to dramatically reduce smoking in the US.

The PLP is an inter-generational effort. We are collaborating with the Environmental Studies Programs at the University of SF and SF State and will share student research on the science of plastics and the networking potential to end the reliance on plastics. Please join SFV members Frances Payne, Michele Sterling and Bill Haskell, along with SFV volunteer Robert Weiner, to learn about the PLP - and what you can do to stop the damage to our environment caused by plastics!


